ILLINOIS HOME WINS '21 KRISTEN VISSER HISTORICAL PRESERVATION AWARD

The William Drummond-designed Brookfield Kindergarten (1911) in Brookfield, Illinois, is the winner of the 2021 Kristen Visser Historical Preservation Award. The biannual award has been presented since 2007 by the board of directors of the Seth Peterson Cottage Conservancy.

The Brookfield Kindergarten is owned by Nick and Lauren Witkowski. Drummond designed the private-school building for Avery and Queene (Ferry) Coonley, of Riverside, Illinois. The couple were early advocates of early childhood education.

Nick bought the house in December 2017, while it was in foreclosure proceedings, as a wedding gift for his wife-to-be, Lauren Waninski. The couple lives there with their daughter.

The T-shaped Brookfield Kindergarten consists of a single

story and a loft, with overall dimensions of 50-by-61 feet. The exterior is white stucco with brown trim.

The building was converted to residential use in the 1940s, when a two-car garage also was added. Since purchasing the home, the Witkowskis have completed a thorough restoration.

According to their award submission: “The Brookfield Kindergarten is important to us and our families. By preserving its history, we hope to contribute to the preservation of American architecture and bring further awareness to the Prairie Style found throughout Chicagoland and the Midwest.”

“The restoration, adaptive reuse and historical preservation

CLOSER TO HOME: IOWA COUPLE BUILDS OWN PETERSON COTTAGE

By a show of hands: Who's had the same idea? Given enough land and budget, would you continue to book time at the Seth Peterson Cottage — or would you build your own?

For Iowa couple Joe and Kelly O'Donnell, the answer was clear. Following an April 2016 stay, they knew just what to do with a 60-acre plot they owned near their St. Donatus home.

"We always wanted to do the Peterson cottage," Joe said. "Right from the get-go."

Work on what they've since dubbed the O'Donnell Stone Cottage began in late 2018, with the installation of an access road. Construction began in early 2019 and wrapped up nearly two years later.

At approximately 1,100 square feet, the cottage is bigger than the 880-square-foot Peterson cottage — notably with a larger bedroom,



kitchen and bathroom with a laundry area. Furnishings have been kept to a minimum, Joe said, to avoid a feeling of clutter.

"We want to make sure that we keep it very open — and fluid."

Two changes have been made to the board of directors.

At our annual meeting in December, Rachel Lohman was elected. She is the owner of a coffee shop in Door County and brings business acumen to the board.

The other change was to add Marcus Jaeger, the Mirror Lake Association president, as an ex-officio member. The Mirror Lake Association is charged with promoting and improving the physical appearance and well-being of Mirror Lake and protecting its future. He replaces Mark Blakeslee, the outgoing president who served in that position for many years.

Thank you, Mark. Welcome, Rachel and Marcus.

The 2021 Kristin Visser Historical Preservation Award winner is described in this issue of our newsletter. The award is given in recognition of past work in historical preservation of a Wright or Prairie School building in Wisconsin or a contiguous state. There were two worthy applications for the award, making it a difficult decision to choose just one.

A note of thank you goes out to the volunteers who helped during our annual spring cleanup following our April open house.

Tasks included splitting and piling firewood, raking leaves, placing wood chips around the cottage, deep-cleaning inside and updating interior features.

MIRROR LAKE STATE PARK REPORT

and be ready for the influx of visitors. As travel and other restrictions are lifting, more people will be hitting the road for Wisconsin state parks.

Last year was very unusual in a lot of respects, and we saw record numbers of visitors to our parks. Every indication is that 2021 will be as busy or even busier than 2020.

All the parks across the state are seeing significant increases in camping reservations, and Mirror Lake is no exception. Camping has been fully booked every weekend since our reservation season began and looks almost completely booked on weekends for the rest of the summer. Weekday camping is seeing a notable increase as well.

We are not yet at the occupancy level of the cottage, but we are staying very busy.

We have a lot of new members on our team operating the park. With the assistance of the returning staff, we will be ready to help our visitors make new memories.

More visitors means more work. Through the hard work of our staff and volunteers, we strive to provide visitors with a safe and enjoyable experience.

We saw a lot of change to our operations in 2020, but our staff was incredibly adaptable and made the best of it. Unfortunately during 2020, we were limited in the amount of work we could do with volunteers.

Mirror Lake has an outstanding group of volunteers, and we missed the chance to work with them. The park certainly is a better place when we can have volunteers with us working to their fullest. We are very excited as we've had more opportunities to work with them in 2021.

As operations guidance continues to change, I will not be able to provide a lot of detail on how we will operate this season.

That being said, I can share a few things.

We are currently open for window service at the visitor center to get visitors their park passes and answer questions.

We also are available by phone at the park office, (608) 254-2333, to answer questions or provide assistance.

Our staff has worked hard this spring to get our facilities up and running. All the campgrounds, shelters, playgrounds and other facilities, including the amphitheater, are open for the season.

Even in the best of times, people find solace and a chance to recharge in nature. Over the last year, we have seen a tremendous number of visitors enjoying the park.

We hope that a visit to Mirror Lake has been a bright spot for people. I encourage you to take time to get out in nature (at Mirror Lake or anywhere else that works for you) and just be in the moment.

I think the design and feel of the Seth Peterson Cottage has always encouraged that connection to nature. I am sure more than a few visitors really needed that connection in the last year.

2021 COTTAGE WORK WEEK

ANNUAL PROJECTS REFRESH AND RESTORE COTTAGE FOR ANOTHER SEASONS

The Seth Peterson Cottage annual work week was held this year from April 11 through April 16. The cool spring weather did not stop our always hardworking group of volunteers from completing the never-ending list of maintenance projects that happen every year.

Our one major project this year was replacing the cedar fascia around the bedroom roof. The corners had become rotten from water penetrating the mitered corners.

Once the old cedar was removed, some rotten sub-fascia was found and replaced with treated lumber to prevent that damage from occurring again.


New cedar trim was installed to make the cottage look new again.

Firewood that was cut, split and stacked outside last fall was moved in to the woodshed. The last of the wood that was cut last spring was split and stacked.

The fireplace stonework was cleaned to remove the past years' soot and smoke.

The stone floor was cleaned, and all the upholstery was shampooed.

A new mattress and box spring were delivered. New brass wall plates were installed on all electrical switches and outlets, and new shades were installed on the table and floor lamps.

These and many more maintenance projects were accomplished to complete another successful work week.

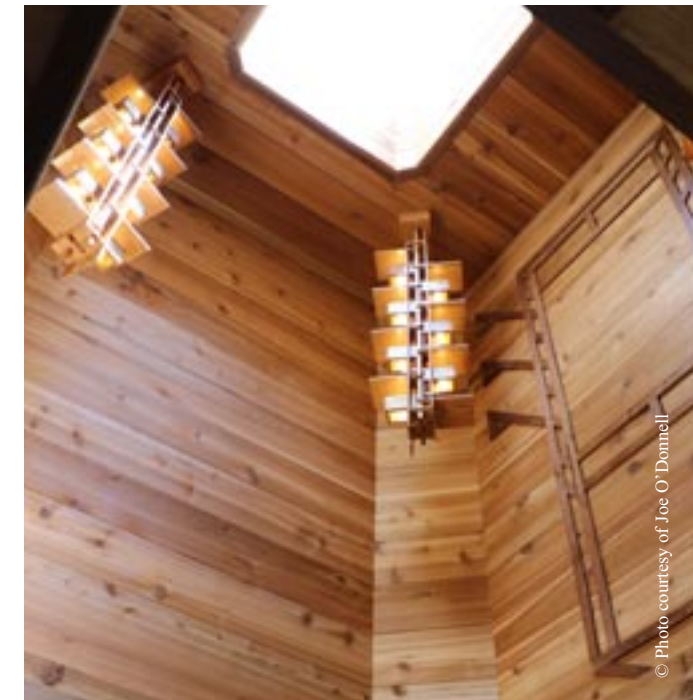
Norm & Carol, Orfordville

Audrey died almost 20 years ago, just before my wife gave birth to our now strong-willed, determined daughter. Her name is Quinn Audrey Jaeger.

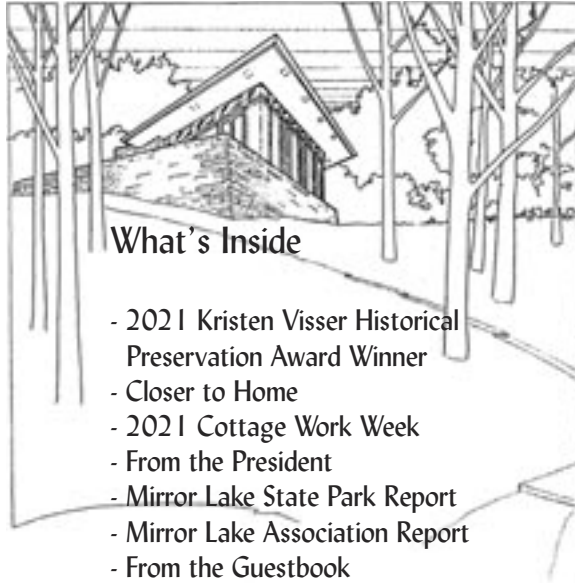
